

Self-Assessment Sheet for Japanese Proficiency

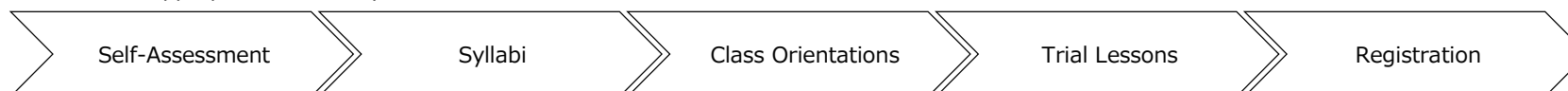
