- Expert-Led: Immerse yourself in Japanese culture with guidance from experts


Eligibility: (1) Undergraduate or graduate students from TMU's partner institutions and (2) those who have never studied Japanese or are at a beginner level. (Admission is competitive with only 24 seats available.)

Application Process

Step 1: Ensure you are nominated by your home university's international office.

Step 2: Prepare the following documents: (1) Visa request form (if required)

- (2) Official transcript (3) Copy of passport photo page (valid at least 6 months after program ends)
- (4) ID Photo (PDF, max 500KB) (5) SPOT90 Test Result (All students are required to take this test,

Step 3: Submit them via the following URL or the QR code by November 7.

During the selection process, we will comprehensively evaluate the application documents and the information provided in the form.

Program Fee Payment: The program fee includes accommodation, textbooks, admission fees for field studies and workshop materials. The fee of 140,000 JPY should be paid by overseas remittance(credit card is not available) no later than December 5. (Payment instructions will be provided upon application acceptance.)

Cancellation Policy: A cancellation fee applies after application acceptance and program fee payment. Cancellations received by December 12 qualify for a 50% program fee refund. Subsequent cancellations are non-refundable.

Japanese Language Course: There are 2 classes: *Starter and Elementary 1*. Your class will be determined based on the scores of SPOT90 (All students are required to take this test, even if you haven't studied Japanese.). The objectives of each class and their relationship with the CEFR level are also shown below.

- Starter (CEFR Level A1): This class is for those who have never studied Japanese before, and wish to interact in everyday situations, such as shopping and at restaurants. If your score of SPOT90 is between 0 and 25, you will be placed in this class. Textbook: Nihongo Fun & Easy: Survival Japanese Conversation for Beginners 2nd edition.
- Elementary 1 (CEFR Level A2.1): This class is for those who wish to talk about simple things such as your family, job, and your town. If your score of SPOT90 is between 26 and 40, you will be placed in this class. Textbook: Marugoto: Japanese language and culture, Elementary 1 (A2); Coursebook for communicative language activities "katsudo" and competences "Rikai."

Award of Certificate: To receive a certificate of completion, participants <u>must meet a minimum score</u> requirement. Those who do not fulfill all the criteria will instead receive a certificate of participation. Please note that a certificate of participation is not equivalent to a certificate of completion. Participants will be evaluated based on their class participation (40%), in-class activities (40%), and a presentation (20%).

Important Information:

- Travel Insurance: <u>Participants must purchase their own traveler's insurance</u> to cover medical expenses during their stay.
- Device: Please bring a laptop or tablet for class activities.
- Textbook: The program will provide the required textbook upon your arrival.
- Program Fee: Covers single room accommodation at Hashimoto Park Hotel (3-4-4 Hashimoto, Sagamihara, Kanagawa 252-0143, Tel: +81-42-774-6112, https://www.booking.com/hotel/jp/hashimoto-park.html); but does not include meals, airfare, traveler's insurance, transportation between the university and accommodation, or other daily expenses.
